Description:

The foliage on this variety emerges medium green then turn bright chartreuse and yellow that is brighter with more sun; black scapes emerge, adding dramatic contrast with lavender spikes of flowers in mid-summer

Ornamental Features

Little Black Scapes Hosta features dainty spikes of lavender tubular flowers rising above the foliage in mid summer, which emerge from distinctive violet flower buds. Its attractive textured pointy leaves emerge green in spring, turning chartreuse in color throughout the season.

Landscape Attributes

Little Black Scapes Hosta is a dense herbaceous perennial with tall flower stalks held atop a low mound of foliage. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other garden plants with less refined foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Insects

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Planting & Growing

Little Black Scapes Hosta will grow to be about 10 inches tall at maturity extending to 22 inches tall with the flowers, with a spread of 24 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 20 inches apart. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
