

## Lemon Juice Hosta



### Lemon Juice Hosta

*Hosta 'Lemon Juice'*

#### Description:

Attractive lanceolate leaves have wide green margins with bright yellow stripes up the middle; tetraploid variety has lavender shaded flowers that rise up on short scapes in mid summer; a striking addition to the garden or border

#### Ornamental Features

Lemon Juice Hosta features dainty spikes of lavender tubular flowers rising above the foliage from mid to late summer. Its attractive textured pointy leaves remain bluish-green in color with prominent yellow stripes and tinges of white throughout the season.

#### Landscape Attributes

Lemon Juice Hosta is a dense herbaceous perennial with tall flower stalks held atop a low mound of foliage. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other garden plants with less refined foliage.

This is a relatively low maintenance plant, and is best cleaned up in early spring before it resumes active growth for the season. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Insects

- General Garden Use
- Groundcover

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### Planting & Growing

Lemon Juice Hosta will grow to be about 10 inches tall at maturity extending to 14 inches tall with the flowers, with a spread of 24 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 20 inches apart. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years. As an herbaceous perennial, this plant will usually die back to the crown each winter, and will regrow from the base each spring. Be careful not to disturb the crown in late winter when it may not be readily seen!

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It prefers to grow in average to moist conditions, and shouldn't be allowed to dry out. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
